#### HIS BROTHER WOUNDED.

On Monday morning, September 25th, Mrs. D. Jackson, of 3, Springfield View, Dewsbury, received the following telegram: "Much regret to inform you that your husband. Pte. Dick Jackson, died 18th September in No. 39 Clearing-Station, France; cause, genshot wounds in both legs." The deceased soldier, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ned Jackson, who is 31 years old, when a boy attended the Carlton Road School, and also the Springfield Sunday School. Prior to enlist-

ing nineteen months ago he worked for his uncle, Mr. Ned Ramsden, painter, Dewsbury. Ho went to the Front last November, and there met his death, probably in the Big Push on the Somme. He was last home on leave in June. The gallant soldier leaves a wife and three children to mourn his loss. His brother, Lance-Corpl. Rolla Jackson, who is in the Leeds Rifles, had been reported missing, and is now known to be hospital as the result of a wound sustained on September 3rd. Although letters have been written to the York authorities, the location of the hospital is not known.

#### DIED IN GERMAN HANDS.

As we stated in our last issue, Pte. Harry Barelay (18), Nortalk Regiment (son of Mr. A. Barelay, The Hollies, Headfield Road, Savile Town), has died a prisoner of war in Germany. He joined up on October 15th, 1917, and went to France on April 3rd, 1918. He was bally wounded in both legs on April 15th and taken prisoner. He died in a German hospital in Soltau on May 20th. Pto. I will tell you where I last saw him. It was at the night of \_\_\_\_ I had just been with my sergeant-major, and when I came back they were digging themselves in, as the Ger-

for Harry, and I found him all right. I had just started digging when a shell burst just in front of us, and I got hit in the knee. I fell off for a while, and when I came round Harry was by my side, and he neked me if he could help me; and he helped me to the dressing-station. It was very hot, as the Germans were giving us plenty of shell. He had then to go back to his company so he shock hands with me and said "Cheer up, old sport." That was where I last saw him, and he was quite all right then.

### STILL NO "OFFICIAL" NEWS OF PTE. WAINWRIGHT.

Pts. Ben Weinwright, of the 2nd Manchesters, formerly of Batley Carr, where his mother new lives, and whose wife resides at Broughton, Manchester, is still strongly remoured to be dead. A Batley coldier has written another letter to Mrs. Wainwright at Broughton, stating that he has seem his pal's grave and spoken to the dasplain who buried him about the burial. No notice had come from the War Office the other evening in confirmation of the remour of his death.
