

NEWS RECEIVED ON ARMISTICE DAY.

On the day of the signing of the armistice, official notification was received by Mr. and Mrs. Hinchliffe, of Whitley Road, Thornbill, of the

death in action, on November 4th, of their son, Second-Lieut, F. B. Hinchliffe (26), Duke of Wellington's West Regiment. Riding Second-Lieut. Hinchliffe enlisted as a private in September. 1915, and in July of this year obtained a commission for which he had trained at New College, Oxford. was over on leave as late as October. As a boy he attended Whitley C.E. School, later Wheelwright Grammar School, and finally the South Wales Training College, Car-

marthen. He took up teaching as a profession and on enlistment was an assistant teacher at the Bootbroyd Lane School. He attended Whitley Church.

RECTOR'S STRIKING SERMON.

The handsome tablet placed in the main hall of Thornhill Church School in memory of 42 old boys who fell in the war was unveiled on Saturday last. Inscribed on the tablet is: "1914. Pro Dec et Rege et Patria. 1918. In thankful re-membrance of the old boys of the Thornhill Church School who did their duty even unto death. Requiescant in Pace." The names of the fallen are engraved in bronze on the two side panels of the tablet as follow: Ernest Asquith, Walter Booth, Edgar R. THORNHILL SOLDIER DIES OF WOUNDS.

Widespread sympathy will be felt with Mr. and Mrs. W. Micklethwaite, of 71, Sunset View, Thornhill, in the loss of their fourth son, Pto. Clement Micklethwaite (21), K.O.Y.L.I., who died of wounds on October 22nd. The official intimation (received on Thursday) states that he was suffering from a gunshot wound in the right thigh and other serious injuries, which ended fatally. The fallen soldier enlisted in August, 1915, going out to Egypt at the end of that year. He was transferred to France in



March, 1916, and was wounded on July 1st. He formerly worked at Ingham's Colliery, Thornhill, as a by-worker. Ptc. Micklethwaite received his early education at the Thornhill Church of England School, and also attended the Thornhill Baptist Church and Sunday School. He is the brother of Corpl. J. Micklethwaite, who will be remembered as having won the Military Medal in July, 1916, and who is now stationed at Rugeley.
