News of the death from wounds of her son, Gunner Arthur Heaton, R.F.A., was received on Friday by Mrs. W. Reaton, Stonebyrst Avenue, Crackenedge, Devabury, The chaplain who had

Before joining up, in September 1916, he was closely concerted with the Springfield Congregational Sunday School, of which he was the nestaint secretary. His brother, Pte. Edgarfication (19), North-unberdaid Pusikers, is

in hospital suffering from treach favor and the effects of gas-posoning. When he was gassed he was for four days blind and speechless, and when these afflictions passed off he began to sufferent trench fever. Both prothers were educated at Mill Lane Council School.
