DEWSBURY SACRIFICES



**THROUGH THE WAR WITHOUT A SCRATCH.**

Official news has been received of the death in Salonika, from pneumonia, of Driver Frank Convey, who formerly resided with his sister at 67, High Street, Dewsbury. Driver Convey, who was 24 years of age, was mobilised at the outbreak of the war as a member of the Heckmondwike Artillery, and went out to France in April, 1915. He saw much active service in France and Belgium during a year and eight months' stay, after which he was sent out to Salonika, where he had spent nearly two years, and where he died on November 20th. He had been all through the period of the war without receiving a "scratch" from the enemy. He was formerly employed in Messrs. E. Fox's dye-house, Calder Bank, and was a playing member of the Dewsbury Celtic Football Club.
