

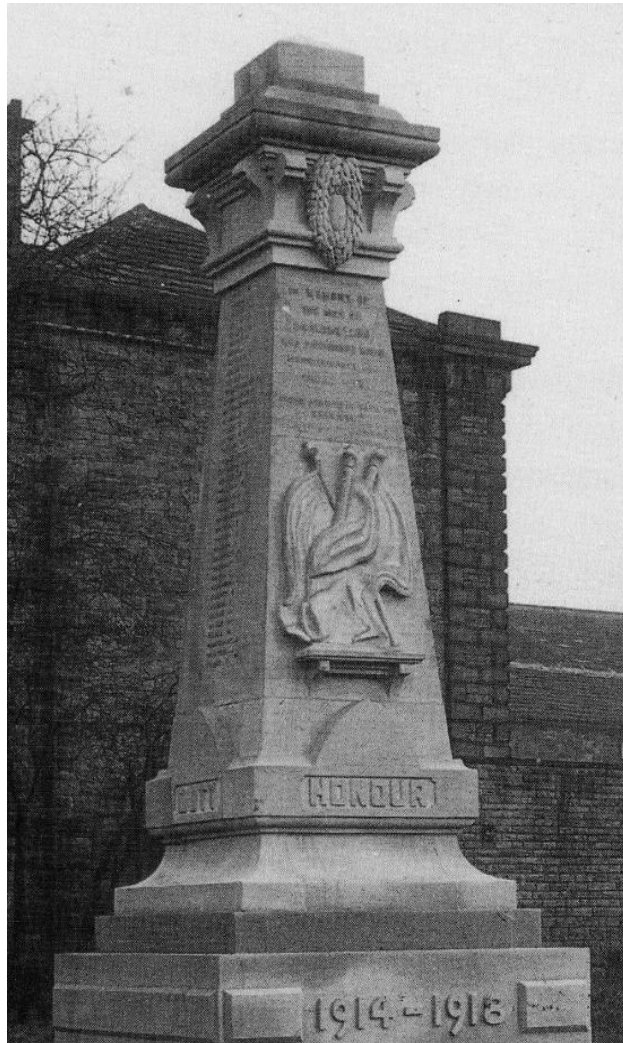

EARLSHEATON SOLDIER'S DEATH.

Deep regret is felt in the district at the death in action on March 28th of Lance-Corpl. Percy Daughtry (22), Northumberland Fusiliers (only son of Mr. and Mrs. B. Daughtry, of 192, Old Bank Road, Earlsheaton). Before joining up in April, 1916, Lance-Corporal Daughtry was employed as a "low-ender" at Messrs. M. Oldroyd and Sons' Calder Mills. He will be greatly missed at Highfield Chapel, where he was formerly in the choir, and was associated with the band of hope. As a boy he attended Earlsheaton Council School.

DEWSBURY YOUTH KILLED.

Private Richard Alfred Burns (19), of the R.O.Y.L.I., eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Burns, 49, Hollinroyd Road, Dewsbury, was killed in action on November 30th. He joined the Forces in August, 1916, and had been in France just over two months. He was an old boy of Dewsbury Parish Church Day and Sunday Schools, and a member of the Sir Wilfrid Lawson Sub-Division Sons of Temperance (Dewsbury). Private Burns, who would have been 20 had he lived till Boxing Day, was employed at the Spinkwell Mills of Messrs. M. Oldroyd and Sons on his enlistment, but previously worked for Boots, cash chemists, Market Place.
