Bradford Road, Dews-bury, but shortly afterwards he went to at Messrs.



EARLSHEATON SULDIER FALLS.

The information is now to hand confirming the death of Pte. H. Lee Ward, K.O.Y.L.I. (son of Mrs. Ward, 24. Commercial Street, Earlsheaton). The soldier, who was only 20 years of age, formerly attended the National Schools, Earlsheaton, and also had a connection with both the Church Institute and the Highfield Cricket Club He joined the Army towards the latter end of 1915, and went out to France at Easter in the following year. Pte. Ward was reported missing as from July 1st. 1916.

SNIPED IN FRANCE.

On August 16th, 1916, he was wounded in France and brought over to England, and he remained in a military hospital at Bangor for a few months. As recently as the end of March last he was at home. On April 23rd he wasshot by a sniper.

EARLSHEATON SOLDIER DIES IN HOSPITAL.

Official news has been received of the death in hospital in France, from a mastoid abscess, of Driver George Wilson, R.F.A., formerly of Walker Street, Earlsheaton. The soldier, who was only 19 years of age, joined up in August, 1915, and went out to France in the following November. Previous to joining the Army he was employed in the Dewsbury Co-operative bothbering department. He was a past scholar. of the Earlsheaton Council School, and also attended the Wesleyan Sunday School at Earlsheaton.
