A DEWSBURY WAR MEMORIAL

UNVEILED AT THE THORNTON STREET CHURCH.

At a most impressive service held at Thernton Stree Independent Methodist Church, Dewsbury, en Sunday afternoon last, a memorial to the memory of the fallen and those who had served in the Great War was unveiled.

The memorial took the form of a carved oak slab, on which was fixed a bronze centre, which was dedicated "To the glory of God and in loving memory of the members of this church who gave their lives, and in honour of those who served in the Great War, 1914-1918." IN MEMORIAM.—An alabaster christening font, suitably inscribed, has been presented by Mrs. William Henry Leeming, of New Westminster, British Columbia, to the Independent Methodist Chapel, Thornton Street, in memory of her nephew, Pte. Fred Seeker, a married son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Secker, of Scargill Street, Dewsbury. Pte. Seeker, who had been associated with the school and chapel named, was killed in the fighting at Arras, on April 9th, 1917.
