### Wheelwright Schools' War Memorial

Old Boys of the Wheelwright Grammar Schools, Dewsbury, rendered magnificent service during the war, the number with the Colours being 421, of whom 47 laid down their lives. The Governors feel that the loyalty of the old Wheelwright boys cannot better be celebrated than in the manner suggested by their Chairman, Major P. B. Walker, who has promised £500 to start a fund for establishing two University Scholarships at the Boys' School. A strong committee has been formed to raise the sum needed—a total of £3,000. The Old Boys Association, through their President, Mr. Harold France, is taking the matter up with enthusiasm. An appeal is also being made to the parents of present boys and to all who are interested in the welfare of the schools to give generous support. Mr. Geo. F. Featherston, Clerk to the Governors, at the Technical School, Dewsbury is acting as treasurer.



### Killed After Serving in Salonica, Palestine and France

Pte. E. Arthur Whittles, London Scottish, whose wife lives at Leicester, and sister, Mrs. Bert Secker, at Victoria Crescent, Dewsbury, was killed in action in France on August 21st. A Wheelwright Grammar School old boy, who before the war was in business at Leicester, he joined up early in 1916, and went to France the following October. Later the same year he was drafted to Salonica, and then to Egypt. He took part in the campaign in Palestine last year, and returned to France last July.

### THORNHILL OFFICER KILLED.

#### NEWS RECEIVED ON ARMISTICE DAY.

On the day of the signing of the armistice, official notification was received by Mr. and Mrs. Hinchliffe, of Whitley Road, Thornhill, of the death in action, on November 4th, of their son, Second-Lieut. F. H. Hinchliffe (29), Duke of Wellington's West Riding Regiment. Second-Lieut. Hinchliffe enlisted as a private in September, 1915, and in July of this year obtained a commission for which he had trained at New College, Oxford. He was over on leave as late as October. As a boy he attended Whitley C.E. School, later the Wheelwright Grammar School, and finally the South Wales Training College, Carmarthen. He took up teaching as a profession and on enlistment was an assistant teacher at the Boothroyd Lane School. He attended Whitley Church.
