

News has come to hand of the death in action on October 28th action of October 28th of Signaller William Wright (21), of the West Yorkshire Regi-ment, Signaller Wright lived with Mr. and Mrs. Henry Watson, of Ivy Cottage, Briest-field, and previous to enlisting, in May, 1915, worked at Messrs. Jaggar's Grange Ash Collieries, Grange Moor. It is a rather sad coincidence that Signaller Wright had got his pass for a leave the same day he was killed. He had been wounded three times previously.
