FORMER DEWSBURY FOOTBALLER KILLED.

A BROTHER IN A CRITICAL CONDITION.

Ex-Detective-Sergeaut George Kendall and family, of Ivy Terrace, Leeds Road, Dewsbury, have been plunged into grief by the receipt of sad news concerning Pte. George Herbert Kendall, Mr. Kendall's eldest son. On Monday he learned that Pte. Kendall had been killed in action. Pte. Kendal was aged 40 when he joined the Durham Light Infantry, and was resident at Spennymoor, County Durham, and manager there of a pawnbroker's shop. He was a native of Dewsbury, and a distinguished scholar of the Eastborough Council School, under Mr. A. Foster, headmaster. His name figures on the homours board as the winner of an Ackreyd scholarship in 1889. It was tenable for two years at the Batley Granimar School, where he made considerable progress in his studies under the late Rev. L. S. Calvert, headmaster. He afterwards became an assistant in the employ of the



late Mr. John Greenwood, pawnbroker,
Church Street, Dewsbury. He demonstrated
his interest in the
Dewsbury Parish
Church Sunday school,
by becoming a teacher.
For several years he
captained the Dewsbury Tuesday Shop Assistants' Football
Club. Upon his marriage the club presented him with an
electro silver-plated tea
service. About thirteen
wears ago he left Dowsbury to take up a

Ite. G. H. Kendell, Durham situation in Birminglight Infantry, Dewsbury ham, and a few years ago he became manager of Pearson's pawnbroker's shop, Spennymoor.

DEWSBURY'S ROLL OF HONOUR

Lieut. R. Max Skelsey's Fate

Lieut. Robert Max Skelsey, Duke of Wellington's, attached T.M.B., the third and married son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Skelsey, "High Croft," Dewsbury, and Duchy Read, Harrogate, was killed in action on March 29th. He had previously been posted as missing from that date. Lieut. Skelsey, who was educated at Hymer's College, Hull, was with his father in the business of Messrs. Cox Bros, and Skelsey, woollen manufacturers, Ravens Wharf Mill, Ravensthorpe, until he joined the Forces as an officer in the early part of 1915. For some time he acted as Adjutant at an English training camp. He went to France towards the end of 1916, and was wounded last year, returning to the Front four months ago.

Young Dewsbury Chemist's Fate in Doubt.

Pioneer Gerald K. Coultas (20), Chemist's Section, Royal Engineers, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Coultas 14, Pyrah Street, Dewsbury, is officially posted "missing, believed killed," on June 23rd. An old boy of Carlton Road Council and Batley Grammar Schools, he early showed a leaning towards chemistry, and after being apprenticed with Mesers, Boots, Dewsbury, he was employed in the chemistry department at Southill Coke Ovens He joined up in August, 1916, and went abroad the following November with a special corps of the Royal Engineers. He attended St. Mark's Church and Sunday School, and was secretary to the local branch of the St. Andrew's Society.
