
Popular Hanging Heaton Soldier Shot Through the Lungs

A well-known Hanging Heaton soldier, Pte. Frank Co., incom (29), London Regiment, son of Mr. and Mrs. Digby Collinson, Chidawell Lane, Dewabury, is reported killed. His Lieutenant writes:— "He was shot through the lungs to-day (September 44b), and deed immediately. He was buried by our Padre. He was a vesy good fellow, and a great favourice, and his less will be very keenly felt by all of us."

Enlisting in November, 1914, Pte. Collinson had a varied Army carrier. From France he was transferred to Salonika, and from there to Paleesine, and he was wounded at Beersheba. He returned to France after two years in the Holy Land, and was on leave a month ago. An old bey of Hanging Heaton Church Day Schoole, he was also connected with the Parish Church, and a former choir box. Before enlisting he was employed by Mesera Joseph Wilson and Sone, clothing manufacturers, Batley Carr. His eldest brother, Willie, is in France, and his younger brother, Leonard, is serving in India.

Another name has to be added to the roll of Hanging Heaton's honoured dead. We refer to the late Pte. Joseph Bailey, Duke of Wellington's Regiment, of 12, Owl Lane. The soldier's mother has received kind and sympathetic letters from a second-lieutenant and from some of his old comrades. We gather from these letters that Pte Bailey was fatally shot as he and his comrades were leaving the trenches. He was formerly an old scholar of the Hanging Heaton Parish Church.

His platoon commander writes of him: "I am his platoon commander, and in him I have lost one of my best Lowis gunpers, He was a fine fellow and adboy's death was instan. taneous, as a shell burst close to him; several of his comrades paying the same

price." Before joining the Army, Pte. Senior was employed by F. and T. Mitchell, plumbers, Savile Town. He was connected with the Ebenezer Chapel and Sunday School, Hanging Heaton.
